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Dear Parents/Carers,

As we come to the end of a busy and exciting term, I just wanted to take a little time to reflect on, what has been, a special term. We have been in a unique position in Guernsey to be able to lead normal lives, and have really made the most of that this term. Staff have brought the curriculum to life with visiting speakers, trips out and about and other exciting events. If you add them up there have been about 40 special events this term, that is nearly three a week! The girls certainly do benefit from a great deal of variety during their time at school.

# **Out and About**

Every class in Melrose has been on at least two trips this term to support their learning, with some classes having been out and about a great deal more. The Pre-Preparatory department has been to The Rocquettes Cider Farm and B & Q to select their Christmas Tree. Other trips have included the Fire Station, Reservoir, Saumarez Park Folk and Costume Museum and the Guille-Allès Library amongst many others and Form I are even squeezing in a trip today to L'Ancresse Common and Candie Museum.













### Fun at home

There has also been a great deal going on at school. Forms I and II have benefitted from our excellent Forest Schools programme, run by Miss Kinley and Junior Remove will enjoy their programme next term.

Each class, from Middle Prep to Form III has led a whole school assembly this term. These have been wonderful and varied, either celebrating the girls' learning or creating a presentation on a theme. Assemblies are an excellent way for the girls to put many of their Melrose Mindsets into practice, along with developing independent learning. Most assemblies are based on research and independent work by the girls themselves, requiring strong collaborative skills. Parents have enjoyed some of these assembles and other classes will invite parents over the next two terms.





The Junior girls have enjoyed some House events this term, including House Rounders and the end of term House Quiz. The weekly House Point totals have been very close this term and so anyone could be House of the Term!





### **Visitors**

As well as going out, we have been fortunate enough to allow visitors into school to support the girls' learning. Visitors have included Jo Dowding who spoke to Form III about Victorian toys, Phil Baskerville who has worked with Form II on 'Old Testament Mini'and Mrs Sharma, who took a wonderful assembly on Diwali and then spent the morning sharing her knowledge in the Pre-Preparatory Department.

In addition, we have worked with Helen from Arts for Impact on a whole school mural to celebrate Freedom. This project was originally set to take place during Liberation week to celebrate 75 years of Freedom but was postponed, due to lockdown. We were determined for this project to go ahead and so changed the brief slightly to celebrate what freedom meant for the girls following lockdown. The result has been a colourful and quite poignant piece of art work which is displayed on our fence. We are just waiting for the plaque to explain its significance and we hope that it will still be there in another 75 years time.







# **Thinking of Others**

We have continued to remind the girls about the importance of thinking of others. We do this in our day to day routines, PSHE work and assemblies and also in our whole school charity events. This term we have supported the Swimarathon, raising the most money of any primary school, Children in Need, The Royal British Legion, and Save The Children with our Dress for Christmas day. In total we have raised nearly £4,000 for charities just this term. May I thank you all for your support by sending in donations.

However, thinking about others is not just about money and Form III have been able to resume our connection after lockdown with The Cheshire Home. They visited them with food baskets after our Harvest Festival and spent time talking to the residents and went again to sing carols.

The Melrose staff decided not to send each other Christmas cards this year and instead provided gifts to make up five present bags for those who are on their own this Christmas. This Healthspan Christmas initiative is to give gifts to the 450 Guernsey elderly residents in the local community who receive community care, and sometimes the only person they see each week is the community nurse.

The fancy dress Halloween disco was a big hit with the Juniors and one which I am sure will be repeated, the two film nights were as popular as ever and of course the PTA stalls at the Christmas Fayre.
