#### **IGCSE** and A-level results

I am very clear that results do not define the person. It is our experiences, values, attitudes, and responsibility for ourselves and for others, which help us grow into rounded and grounded adults. At College, the importance of soft skills around teamwork, communication and kindness are highly prized. That said, I am incredibly proud of what our students have achieved academically, knowing that it is the professionalism of all my colleagues, the support they receive from parents and most importantly, the terrific attitude of the students in their approach to these academic hurdles, which are key elements of the journey to achieve these important academic milestones. Never was this truer in a year where the system required Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGs) to be the bedrock for the awarding of A-level and GCSE results. Please visit our website to see summary details of results which were, once again, outstanding. Every student can hold their head up high and say that they achieved their best.

#### Parents' Evenings

We can schedule appointments for face-to-face meetings in Melrose and so there is no change to those planned at the time of writing. In the Senior School and Sixth Form, we intend to run remote meetings for Upper Four (Year 9) upwards, yet, Covid permitting, would still like to do face-to-face meetings in Remove and Lower Four, so that we can meet parents and get to know you. We will keep you informed.

#### Term dates

These are published on the website https://www.ladiescollege.com/information/term-dates.

I thought it might be useful for you to be aware of a potential change to our published 2022 term dates as early as possible, which we have provisionally agreed with Elizabeth College.

We are currently awaiting confirmation from the States as to whether we will follow the UK May/June Bank Holiday for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, which we hope to receive later this term.

If these changes are agreed by the States, we will have school as usual on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> May and Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> May and the planned Inset day on Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> May will be moved to Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> June. This will then be added to the two Bank Holidays on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> June and Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> June.

I will write to you to either confirm this change or to stay with the current dates, as soon as the decision is made by the States.

#### **Development Plan**

There are, as always, things that we want to work on and develop this year. Key headline developments are as follows:

#### **Open Morning / Open Week**

We have moved this to mid-September for two reasons. The first is to avoid any clash with Elizabeth College, which has traditionally been on the same day and the second is in the hope that we might get better weather, although the heavens have opened as I write this today! Melrose will, once again, have a week where visits can be arranged.

We are grateful to students in the Senior School who will be tour guides or being part of demonstrations. Our plan is to have a one-way system for our visitors who will be able to observe at a safe distance, in well-ventilated rooms. We will have Open Morning, keeping everyone as safe as we can, yet still maintaining this important part of asking people to come and see what we do, who we are and why our young people are so motivated to learn and have what is happening explained to them briefly, to get a flavour of the activities available, our educational provision and the engagement of our students.

#### **Future-Ready Skills**

A recent Senior School Curriculum Review helped identify the key skills and characteristics that support lifelong learning. These will be explored in Remove through a new discrete course, as well as being identified and facilitated through subjects for all students. This is part of our future focussed curriculum, which has mastery in curriculum subjects at its heart and which will equip our students with skills and competencies for now and the future and empower them to be able and willing to "engage the world, to change the world". We are also excited to launch a new Key Stage 4 Digital skills course, as part of the option choices for students in Lower Five.

#### Electronic Ilex magazine/Our environment

We intend to write an Environmental Charter this year that will identify how we work towards "net zero" carbon emissions, or at least offset the energy which we need to use in College. The first step we will take this year is to produce Ilex, our magazine which captures the broader experiences and achievements of our pupils and students, online. A small number of copies will be published, yet once the process of production is completed by the Ilex team, parents, guardians, pupils and students will be directed to our website for the new publication. Previous editions can be viewed at any time.

#### **Operoo** (College trips/offsite visits)

We have decided not to renew our contract with Operoo, the online system for managing offsite visits. We subscribed to Operoo on the understanding that work would take place to allow information to pass freely between it and the College's own online information management system, Integris (a process known as two-way integration). Whilst two-way integration was being developed, we accepted it would be necessary to manually upload information from Integris to Operoo; a time-consuming and laborious process. We have since learned that two-way integration between Operoo and Integris is unlikely to be available in the foreseeable future, and therefore we feel it is not cost-effective to extend our working relationship with Operoo.

For parents, this simply means we will ask you to update your child's contact and medical information with the Registrar (registrar@ladiescollege.ac.gg) who will update our Integris records. With immediate effect, all correspondence relating to visits will come directly from the College. You may be relieved to learn it also means the end of automated reminders from Operoo! Our IT department has developed an in-house system which we will be trialling and rolling-out this term.

We are now part of an exclusive global community, recognized and celebrated for educational transformation that includes vision and innovation in teaching, learning, and preparing students for the future.

#### Car Park, drop off and pick up

Thank you for following the drop off and pick-up guidance for students in the Senior School and Sixth Form, as outlined below, which helps to ensure vehicles can come and go for drop-off of our younger pupils at Melrose.

- Parents/Guardians with Senior and Sixth Form students should not drive onto the College site from Monday to Thursday between the hours of 08:00 09:00 and 14:30 16:15 and on Friday 08:00 09:00 and 14:30 15.45. (Please note that these have been amended to make things easier, with a clear request that the times are adhered to).
- Please avoid obstructing drives on **Rocquettes Lane** or **Brock Road**, which form entrance/exit points for students to College. This will allow students exiting by bicycle or moped (from

Rocquettes Lane) to pull out while you are dropping off and will make pedestrian access safer for all. Our neighbours appreciate your consideration of their need to access their properties.

#### Covid-19/illness (please see attached flyer)

Please continue to be vigilant and only attend College if well enough to do so. Reminders about hand washing, respiratory etiquette and respecting personal space is here to stay, in my opinion. We also currently have the opportunity to test twice a week in the Senior School and Sixth Form, to avoid carrying Covid to others and our community is encouraged to do this. I have had a query from one parent with respect to GDPR and sharing your name and address with ESC, in order to manage the delivery of test kits or contact to arrange appointments for our younger children. I can confirm that this information was sent by College to ESC and that this was lawful. They were then able to encrypt your data to the Post Office. I am seeking clarification about whether the data is being held, to potentially manage further deliveries to you, or has been destroyed and will revert when I have clarity about this. We also have other data ready to send to Public Health to help them and to support us, should there be a positive case identified in College. This includes your child's first name, their surname, their date of birth and your contact number.

In terms of absence, whether it be Covid or any other illness where your child is unable to be in College, colleagues are currently checking systems and familiarising the pupils and students with how to access information online. If they are unable to be in College, yet are well enough to work, core work will be provided, at the discretion of the teacher, who may also invite your child to be "live" in the lesson. Please be assured that there is absolutely no expectation that work is completed if your child is unwell. Pre-Covid, work was not provided until after the third day of absence and this is something that we will review in the future, when the Covid response to stay at home may no longer be a requirement.

#### Management of contacts of a case from an educational or early years setting

I also share the below detail provided by the States which outlines their approach should an individual in College test positive for Covid-19.

1. Should a case be detected in a school or setting, the positive case must follow all instructions as directed by Public Health. Contacts of the positive case beyond the school/setting environment

may be viewed as a household or social contact and will be contacted by Public Health as part of the current contact tracing policies.

2. Specific case management advice has been developed for educational settings. This is different from case management approaches for household/social/community contacts.

The guidance below is specific to education contact case management.

Students and fully vaccinated staff can attend if:

- they have a negative lateral flow test (under supervision if the child is under 12) for the next 10 days, starting from the day of notification and then every morning before school and;
- they remain well with no symptoms of COVID-19, no matter how mild. If they display any symptoms they must stay at home and arrange a PCR test immediately by contacting the clinical helpline on 756938 or 756969 (please do not use lateral flow tests if symptomatic) and;
- in the case of a child, the child can be collected from their setting promptly if they begin to develop any symptoms whilst at school and;
- in the case of a child, they do not attend any after-school or extra-curricular activities during the next 10 days when they are taking daily lateral flow tests. Please note that children will not be able to take part in any school trips at this time.
- 3. For all primary, & secondary schools, and colleges, if a positive case is determined to have attended school while potentially contagious, the Contact Tracing team will contact the Headteacher/Principal (or other nominated individual) and the setting will undertake the necessary provision of contact information to the Contact Tracing team.
- 4. Those identified as contacts must maintain a low threshold (i.e. even mild symptoms or slightly unwell) to stay at home and/or being sent home if unwell. They can attend educational settings only if they are asymptomatic and have a negative LFT result that morning.
- 5. In early years settings, children who are determined by Public Health to be close contacts of a positive case will be required to have a PCR test and can return to school only if the result is negative and the child is asymptomatic. Parents/carers are expected to be vigilant for any symptoms in their child, with a low threshold to stay at home and/or being sent home if unwell. Children can attend early years settings only if they are asymptomatic.
- 6. There may be circumstances where individuals are simultaneously determined to be education contacts, and household and social contacts by Public Health. If this is the case, those individuals will receive bespoke advice from Public Health about actions they need to take and the relationship between those actions and the education contact advice in this guidance.

In closing, I thought I would share with you a quote from a course I attended last term. It was, "If we haven't got space to talk openly, then we haven't got a space to develop". I think that resonates with everyone in any community and with that in mind, as always, please do not hesitate to make contact if you have any queries or concerns.

# Academic Achievement in Girls' Schools 2018-2019


This report is based on the Department for Education (DfE) School Comparison data for England for the academic year 2018-2019. As a result of the pandemic, the DfE will not be publishing any school or college level educational performance data based on tests, assessments or exams for 2020 or 2021.

#### Girls' A Level Entries in Maths and Science subjects – 2018-2019

DfE release KS5 (A level) entries by school for Maths, Further Maths and Science subjects, split by gender and type of school, allowing us to analyse the performance of girls by the type of school they attend. The data shows that:

- Girls in girls' schools (of all types) are 2.5 times as likely to take Further Maths and Physics compared to girls in other schools.
- The uptake of other sciences is also higher with Biology 40% higher, Chemistry 77% higher and Computer Science 72% higher in girls' schools compared to girls in other schools.





#### KS4 and KS5 attainment data – 2018-19

The DfE 16-18 performance tables report achievements of students aged 16 to 18 who are at the end of advanced level study, (the end of Key Stage 5 or KS5). The analysis below uses the average point score per A level entry for students who were entered for at least one AS or A level qualification.

The Key Stage 4 (KS4) data reports the achievements of students using the Attainment 8 measure which allocates points according to grades achieved by pupils in their best 8 subjects at GCSE level (including Maths and English).

#### The data shows that:

- On average, students in girls' schools outperform students in co-ed schools, at both KS4 and KS5
- Girls in girls' schools perform higher than students in co-ed schools across all schools and also when looking at independent schools only

# Flu-like symptoms during the COVID-19 pandemic

#### Dear Parent/Carer,

You have been asked to collect your child from school today because they have developed symptoms that could be linked with COVID-19.

We kindly request that you go directly home and phone the Helpline on 01481 756938 or 01481 756969 to get further advice. If necessary, your child may be referred for testing for COVID-19.

Your child must stay off school until their symptoms have resolved (and, if they were required to have a COVID-19 test the result was negative). If your child has, for example, a lingering cough, you should seek advice from a health practitioner before they return to school. This DOES NOT apply to diarrhoea and vomiting – in these cases your child must be symptom free for 48 hours before they return to school.

If your child is tested and you are looking after them, you are advised to isolate away from any member of your household who has not been fully vaccinated until the receipt of a negative result.

Please don't hesitate to contact your GP for further advice, or call 999 in case of an emergency, if your child's health is concerning you or if he/she develops other symptoms.
