Drop-off

We follow a 'kiss and go' routine. Drop off will be from 8.10am-8.35am.

Parents/carers should drive around the extended one-way system and drop off in the zone in front of the Melrose building. Please stop as far down the zone as possible for more cars to drop off at the same time. Your daughter will then enter the school through the 'cow' door and wait in the Melrose Hall with a member of staff, moving to the classrooms between 8.30 and 8.35am. Registration is at 8.40am and any girl who arrives late should enter the school through Miss Anders' office.

Pick ups

At the end of the day, Preparatory Department girls should be collected from their classroom door and Junior Department girls from the prep playground. On rainy days, Junior Department girls should be collected from the hall but, whether picked up from the hall or the Junior Cloakroom, girls must be collected rather than walk to the car park or run across traffic lanes. Please note that for safety reasons, neither girls nor siblings should play on the outdoor equipment before or after school.

Please note that, linked to Health and Safety and after discussion with the College PTAs, the Governors have decided that there should not be dogs on the school grounds. Parents of pupils at Melrose may leave their dog in the car, if on site, but no dog must be walked onto the site, unless agreed with the Principal or Headteacher, Melrose, linked to a theme of assemblies or a broader educational objective of the College.

If you are unavoidably delayed and cannot collect your daughter on time, please let Miss Anders know. If there are changes to your usual arrangements, please email Miss Anders before 2pm. Girls will not be allowed to go home with another person unless the school has been informed by their parent.



If you wish your daughter to walk home, please inform us in writing. In such circumstances, mobile phones may be left with Miss Anders, in the office, first thing in the morning and collected after school. **The Melrose direct line is 01481 721338**.

If nobody arrives to collect your daughter and we are unable to contact you by telephone, we will try to contact the person nominated by you on your registration form, as the next person to call. Please ensure that these emergency contact details are kept up to date and that you notify us of any changes to telephone numbers etc.

Breakfast Club

Breakfast Club is available from 7.45am each morning. Places are limited and should be booked in advance. Please contact Mrs E. Reynolds – lreynolds@ladiescollege.ac.gg. – about availability and charges.

Co-Curricular Clubs

After School Care

Attendance

Girls are expected to be in school throughout the day. We understand that specialist appointments are not always easy to arrange at suitable times but routine medical and dental appointments should be made at lunch time or after school wherever possible.

If parents wish to remove girls from school for any reason, they should apply in writing giving as much notice as possible, to the Head Teacher, requesting permission for such absence. In exceptional circumstances, leave may be authorised. However, as missing school for reasons other than illness is not in the girl's best interest, in most instances requests for additional holiday days are not authorised. Work will not be set in case of absence, unless there are exceptional circumstances.





The Melrose Mindset

At Melrose, we have identified 6 Growth Mindset elements to underpin the girls' learning and approach to the curriculum. The girls are encouraged to use these in all aspects of their learning and school life. Rewards and feedback will be based as much on the girls' attitude to learning as on their end result, in order to encourage effort and persistence. The Melrose Mindsets are Collaborative, Initiative, Curiosity, Risk Taking, Resilience and Reflective. Please refer to our Melrose Mindset booklet for more information.

In the Preparatory Department, each Mindset is related to a character and a story to give the girls an example of the learning behaviour in an understandable context.

The Curriculum

We follow the National Curriculum (2014) as the basis of our teaching and learning, although we do go beyond these requirements in many areas.

We expand and extend areas of the curriculum to ensure the girls receive a well-rounded, balanced education. We run a comprehensive Forest School programme throughout the school. Forest School teaching develops the independent learning skills which are so important in the world today. The Forest School approach is designed to enhance our curriculum, offering deep and unforgettable learning experiences using the outdoor environment. Melrose also has 'Beach School' status with a qualified member of staff and the beach is also used as a valuable learning resource.

Cross curricular studies provide the opportunities to increase social and global awareness, introducing the theme of global citizenship and responsibilities. Whole school initiatives, such as recycling, and discovery days during the year, enrich this learning.

PSHE (Personal, social and health education)

At Melrose, for Middle Preparatory to Form III, this follows an enquiry-based approach across the school and has three core themes: Health and Wellbeing, Relationships and Living in the Wider World, which form termly or half-termly topics, each of which responds to a 'big question'. The overarching key questions, such as 'How do we show our feelings?' and 'How can we be safe online and using social media?' act as the topic titles and allow for the course to be catered to individual needs as well as the needs of the class.

The curriculum is enhanced by the use of visiting speakers, outings and workshops and the girls are encouraged to bring relevant items or information from home.



Preparatory Department

In Lower Preparatory, the Foundation Stage curriculum is used with seven areas of learning: Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Physical Development, Communication and Language, Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design.

As the girls move into Middle and Upper Preparatory, they follow the guidelines of the National Curriculum (2014). Subject areas covered are: English, Mathematics, Science, History, Geography, Design and Technology, Art and Design, Religious Education, French, Personal, Social and Health Education, Music, Physical Education, and ICT. These subjects are not always taught discretely. A cross-curricular approach enhances the learning of topics and makes learning fun. Girls also benefit from weekly ballet lessons which are taught by a specialist teacher.

The core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science are underpinned with recognised schemes:

English – Read, Write, Inc., Talk for Writing

Mathematics – Collins Busy Ants, Numicon

Science – Rising Stars 'Switched on Science'

Swimming lessons are part of the curriculum and offer essential skills and all girls are expected to participate. Generally, if a girl is not well enough to swim, she is probably not well enough to attend school.





Junior Department

The Junior Department lessons cover the same subject areas as the Preparatory Department with the addition of Drama. As the pupils progress though the year groups, there is an increased amount of specialist teaching in subjects such as Physical Education, Music, Drama and Science.

English

The development of communication skills is encouraged through reading, writing, speaking and listening. All these skills are taught and used throughout the curriculum. We follow the new Collins Treasure House Scheme.

Reading

Reading for understanding is encouraged in a variety of ways, including guided reading and more formal comprehension lessons, in addition to library sessions. During guided reading lessons, the girls work in small groups on carefully selected texts which match their reading ability. The aim of these lessons is two-fold: to improve reading fluency and expression and also to encourage a deeper understanding of texts through focused questioning and discussion. Weekly homework is set to support the reading work covered in class. In addition, girls are encouraged to read a range of reading materials at least twice per week at home.

Writing

Writing includes the composition of stories, reports, advertisements, and poetry. Girls are encouraged to let their thoughts and ideas flow, using phonic approximations for spellings. When the exercise is completed, they are then taught to edit their own work. Such editing may be guided or free. Grammar and punctuation are also taught to support free writing and weekly guided writing sessions are used for targeted work to improve writing skills.

Speaking and Listening

Speaking and listening can take a variety of forms, from discussing a poem to performing a play or demonstrating how to do something or debating a topic.

Handwriting

Handwriting is taught on a regular basis in the Lower Junior Department. The letter or letters being taught are demonstrated and discussed before the girls practise either the letters alone or in context. Short, regular sessions have the benefit of focusing attention on good, joined handwriting and presentation. Hopefully, this will then be carried on to other lessons.

Spelling

Phonic knowledge underpins spelling in the Preparatory Department and increasingly pupils learn the variations of spelling the same sound. In the Junior Department, pupils build upon this knowledge. They are taught to understand root words and the general principles for adding prefixes and suffixes. Targeted Guided Spelling sessions take place and the Nessy Spelling programme underpins individual spelling input.



Mathematics

Collins Busy Ant Maths is our main Mathematics scheme, and we also use a variety of other books and resources. The main strands in Mathematics are -

NumberMeasurementGeometryStatistics

Mental arithmetic is an important part of Mathematics, and a sound knowledge of times tables is essential if girls are to be able to think quickly. The girls take Times Tables Challenges on a weekly basis. We also help the girls to discover a range of strategies to use in their work. All girls also have individual passwords to access Mathletics, an online Mathematics learning resource. Problem solving is a key area and girls are encouraged to apply skills and reason mathematically.

A range of appropriate software is available, enabling us to use ICT in Mathematics. In the Michaelmas term, Forms II and III take part in the Primary Mathematics Challenge, set by the Mathematical Association.

Science

Science is taught in line with the 2014 National Curriculum from the Rising Stars 'Switched on Science' scheme, which continues from the Preparatory Department.

There is a great emphasis on practical learning using everyday items, fondly known as 'kitchen sink science'. This practical element forms part of the 'Scientific Enquiry' strand and includes choosing fair and appropriate tests and recording results or observations in an appropriate manner. Girls in Forms II and III have their lessons taught by Senior School teachers and use Senior School facilities when possible.





History

A high-quality history education will help pupils gain a coherent knowledge and understanding of Britain's past and that of the wider world. It should inspire pupils' curiosity to know more about the past. Our aim is to encourage the girls to ask perceptive questions, think critically, weigh evidence, sift arguments, and develop perspective and judgement. History helps pupils to understand the complexity of people's lives, the process of change, the diversity of societies and relationships between different groups, as well as their own identity and challenges of their time. In the Junior Department, we teach history topics chronologically.

Geography

Over the course of the Juniors, we move from local to global scales, seeing the World in a logical way, studying physical, human and environmental Geography. By the end of Form III, pupils should know and understand the locations of continents, oceans, and capital cities, as well as the challenges and development of the Third World. We encourage investigation by using a variety of resources, including the Internet, to determine the most suitable for our line of enquiry.

Cross Curricular Studies

The Junior pupils will also study a cross curricular project at least once a year which will increase their global or social awareness and incorporate a wide variety of skills, including collaborative work and independent learning.







Religious Studies

In our Religious Studies teaching, we aim to offer the girls a broad-based understanding of the significance of religious belief and its importance to people in different cultures. Although we touch on a variety of religious traditions, the main focus of our teaching is about Christianity. Children take a broad look at religion, becoming aware of a range of different religious traditions from around the world and studying some common themes such as festivals and sacred writings.

ICT

ICT is taught as a discrete subject using the Rising Stars Scheme and also within other curriculum subjects such as English, Maths and Science. The Junior girls are taught skills that enable them to use many different devices such as iPads, laptops, cameras and electronic microphones. Our ICT curriculum has several focus areas:

- Using the internet safely
- Using technology to communicate
- Digital Media
- Programming and control
- Creativity, graphics and modelling





Art and Design Technology

The Art curriculum encompasses a range of artists and techniques. It is used to support other areas of the curriculum as well as being a subject in its own right. Girls experience painting, drawing, collage, 3D work, printing, textiles, construction, colour, shape and design, developing skills using a range of materials.

Design and Technology involves the planning, designing and evaluation of various projects. Wherever possible, it is linked to topics which are being studied in other areas of the Key Stage 2 curriculum.

Music

Music in the Junior department is designed to be fun, stimulating and inclusive. All pupils have the opportunity to perform throughout the year and on top of choirs and instrumental groups (music making, handbells, flute, saxophone, recorder) have a weekly lesson with Ms Owen, a music specialist. Based on a traditional foundation relevant to children today, the curriculum encourages each girl to develop her musicianship progressively and achieve her full potential.

Active music-making, composing, performing, listening and appreciation give the girls skills, understanding and confidence to take with them through life.

The girls perform in the Carol Service, Guernsey Eisteddfod and Summer Concert and often have invitations to perform in the wider community.





Drama

Drama in the Junior department is taught by drama specialists and operates on two levels. On one level, it supports areas of the curriculum where appropriate e.g. English work - exploring texts, poetry and playscripts, role play in History etc. On the second level, it is explored as a subject in its own right and is used to develop various skills, including that of self-expression.

Junior Remove learn basic skills including listening to each other, working as a team, vocal projection and the expression of ideas.

Form I further build on these skills through improvisation inspired by various stimuli e.g. music, poetry, art. We also support the work in English on playscripts.

Form II tune these skills further, this time linking them to characterisations, using masks, props and exploring characters in texts and scripts. This is again linked to English work.

In Form III, Drama work still links closely with English, focusing on Shakespeare and exploring a play in various ways.

All Junior year groups also have the opportunity to use these skills and experience a sense of 'real' performance in the form of the Junior Production in the Lent Term. Form III also learn backstage skills, including operating light and sound systems.





French

We aim to teach French in a way that prepares our pupils to have the capability and confidence to understand and use French as effective communication, using the Headstart and Rising Star schemes. Our specialist teachers provide opportunities for pupils to develop the key skills of speaking, listening and reading, using a fun approach to early language, whilst ensuring linguistic progression.

Physical Education

During their time in the Junior Department, all girls will receive some PE lessons delivered by a subject specialist teacher. The girls will learn a wide variety of skills that can be applied to a range of activities including invasion and striking games, gymnastics and dance, swimming and athletics, all of which are recommended within the National Curriculum guidelines. The girls are also encouraged to maintain a level of fitness to complement their skills. If a girl is unfit for a PE lesson, a letter or email from a parent is required. For those girls who consistently miss PE lessons, a doctor's note is required.

We are fortunate to be able to use the Senior School facilities. We take part in Island wide matches and athletics. Girls also benefit from specialist tuition in a variety of sports from the Guernsey Sports Commission.

Curriculum Enrichment

The Junior Department girls benefit from a Curriculum Enrichment programme, which runs on Tuesday afternoons. Through this, they may experience half term blocks of subjects aimed to broaden and further enhance the curriculum. These subjects are often taught by specialist teachers. Areas may include: Food and Design Technology, ICT projects, specialist PE units, Outdoor Learning and Forest School.





Assessment for Learning (AFL)

The Ladies' College, Melrose, follows 'Assessment for Learning' initiatives aimed at further improving teaching and learning.

At the start of a lesson, the teacher will share the 'learning intention' with the girls. This will then be broken down into success criteria i.e. the things the children need to do to achieve the learning intention. We hope this will help the girls to become more active learners with a better understanding of what they are learning and why. It will also allow teachers to give the girls more focused feedback on their progress.

You may hear the girls using the following terminology at home: WALT - we are learning to and WILF - what I'm looking for.

Assessment in all subjects is ongoing throughout the year. It is differentiated to give all girls the opportunity to show what they are capable of achieving. We also use standardised tests twice a year in order to track individual pupil progress and achievement.

In the Junior Department, there is not an examination week as all assessments take place in normal lesson time to ensure that girls develop a healthy attitude towards examinations and do not miss any other subject lessons such as Art, Music or PE.

Revision, which always aims at understanding and not rote learning, may be given for homework in the Upper Juniors.

In some subjects, such as Art or Technology, assessment will be based on observation, discussion, work in progress and evaluation of the finished result. In Geography, for example, assessment is based on discussion and project work, including oral or written presentation. There are rarely formal assessments in such subjects.





Learning Support

At Melrose we aim to meet the needs of every individual. In the vast majority of cases, this takes place through carefully differentiated work within the classroom. However, some pupils will require additional support, either due to them having varying learning difficulties, or due to them working at a level significantly above that of their peers (Highly Able).

We have a Learning Support department which can offer additional tailored support to help those with additional learning needs. We also recognise the most able girls across the curriculum by adding them to our Highly Able register and making extra provision for their abilities. Please contact your class teacher, who will liaise with Mrs Ingrouille, our Learning Support Co-ordinator, if you feel that your daughter has any special educational needs.

Homework

At Melrose, we believe that homework should encourage the girls to become independent learners, develop good working practices and self-discipline - the skills which they will need for success in future educational life and beyond.

The girls have an intensive school day and so the homework timetables allow time for the girls to develop extracurricular interests and also have 'down time'. The focus is on quality not quantity. Homework is set over several days, or even a week, to allow for organisation around life outside school. Please refer to our 'Helping your daughter with her homework' booklet for more information.

Co-Curricular Activities

A variety of Form outings are undertaken with the girls. We visit museums and local places of interest to support the curriculum. In addition, in the Juniors, other experiences include 'Outdoor Guernsey' activities and residential trips.

Your daughter will take part in several events during the school year including the Carol Service, stage productions, sporting events and our annual Celebration of the School Year. Many girls enter the Eisteddfod in the Art, Music, Literary and French Classes.

Lunch time clubs include choir, music making and various sports clubs.

Music Lessons

Musical instrumental tuition is offered by our team of peripatetic music teachers. Lessons available include recorder, fife, flute, clarinet, saxophone, piano, strings, voice and percussion. Peripatetic music lessons take place during the school day and only one of these can be during school lessons. If you choose for your daughter to have individual music lessons, please be aware that she will miss class lesson time. The teachers will endeavour to support the girls with the work they have missed, however, this is not always possible. For more information regarding individual music lessons, please contact Ms Owen via the school office.



Houses

All girls are allocated to a House on entering the Junior Department. Where possible, girls are put into a House with family connections. House badges should be worn on school blazers. House points are awarded to encourage a positive approach and House events are organised throughout the year to encourage a healthy competitive spirit.

The Houses are: Brock - Red, Carey - White, De Sausmarez - Blue, Durand - Green.

Certificates

Each week in Assembly we present 'Super Star Awards' and 'Achievement' certificates in addition to Tables Club. We also celebrate birthdays, elements of the Melrose Mindset and acts of kindness. We are always pleased to see certificates, badges and other awards which the girls have received for activities which have taken place outside school.

Lunches

Cooked Lunches

The menus can be found on the school website, termly in advance, and parents are asked to select whether their daughter will be having cooked or packed lunches for that term.

Packed Lunches

Packed lunches must be brought in asmall container clearly marked with your child's name. No beverages, including hot drinks, should be brought for lunch as water bottles can be taken into The Core.

The lunchtime supervisors gently encourage but do not force the girls to eat their lunch. Please do not send more food than is reasonable for your daughter to eat. We encourage healthy eating as part of our PSHE programme.

Break

Most girls will wish to have a snack during the morning break. We would prefer healthy snacks, such as fruit or vegetables, wherever possible. Grapes should be cut in half as they can be a choking hazard. It is, however, important that the girls have time to play and do not spend all playtime eating. Please send a suitable snack in a small named container, separate from the lunch container. Sweets and chocolate bars are not acceptable. Exceptions are birthday cakes if girls wish to bring them to share. Birthday cakes should be cut up before sending them into school. Girls should also bring a named bottle of water which can be replenished if necessary during the day.

Please note that food sent into school for break and lunch should not contain nuts.



School Council

Each Form from Middle Preparatory to Form III elects two representatives to the School Council.

Representatives discuss relevant issues in class meetings and then take them to the Council which meets at regular intervals, usually once a fortnight.

Members of the School Council provide 'a voice' for the girls on school issues, giving them an official forum through which they can share their thoughts and ideas. The School Council has arranged surveys, initiated the school's recycling programme, liaised with pupils over the buying of playground equipment and staged events to support their chosen charities. A School Council suggestion box is situated outside the Form I classroom.

Expectations

Girls are encouraged to be kind, caring and respectful of themselves, others, and their possessions. We aim for them to take increasing responsibility for their actions and foster self-discipline, good manners, tolerance, and a caring attitude. They should take pride in their work, appearance, school, and local environment. As the girls move up through the school, we expect them to take an increasing responsibility for the completion of homework and organisation of possessions. The Golden Rules, introduced in the Preparatory Department, underpin our expectations.

School Rules

(Based on the Golden Rules)

We are gentle
We are kind and helpful

We listen

We are honest

We work hard

We look after property

We walk around the school quietly

We have very few incidences of unacceptable behaviour. However, should an incident arise, it will be dealt with on an individual basis and parents informed if necessary. In instances of unacceptable behaviour that may endanger other girls e.g. biting or spitting, the teacher in charge will consult with the Head Teacher and may decide it appropriate to send the individual involved home for the remainder of the day.



Health

All parents have access to the School Nurse for advice about their daughters. Medical screening tests take place in various year groups throughout the school year. Parents will be informed if this screening involves their daughter.

Medicines

Medication will not be administered to pupils in school except in special circumstances when requested by a parent. These requests must be made in writing and be agreed by the Head Teacher. Medication must be clearly labelled with the student's name and exact details about the medicine and dosage instructions. It will be stored in the medicine cabinet in the staff room. When medicines are issued to pupils, the date, time and dosage will be recorded in the Medical Book on the medicine cabinet and initialled by the member of staff administering. Parents will be informed.

A list of children keeping asthma inhalers and EpiPens at school is kept in the office and also in the staff room. Written parental permission must be given for children to bring asthma inhalers and EpiPens to school. Asthma inhalers are kept in the teacher's desk and must be labelled with full instructions for use and a note made of the date and time of use. EpiPens will be kept in a named wallet labelled on the outside with the child's name, and instructions for use. Children requiring EpiPens should keep two packs in school, one will be kept in the marked cupboard in the Melrose staff room and the second will be kept either on their person or, for younger girls, in their classroom. It is the parents' responsibility to check expiry dates of all medications.

Under no circumstances should girls keep medication, including aspirin tablets, cough sweets etc. in their bags, desks, or pockets.

Illness

Exclusion after illness or contagious conditions:

Parents are requested not to send their daughter to school if she is unwell. In cases of accident or illness during school hours, parents will be contacted and asked to take their daughter home or to a doctor.

Girls who have been ill with vomiting and /or diarrhoea should not return to school until 48 hours after the symptoms have stopped.

Girls should not attend school with:

- a reportable illness or condition that is contagious and a physician determines the child has not had sufficient treatment to reduce the health risk to others.
- a bacterial infection such as Impetigo if they have not completed 24 hours of antimicrobial therapy.
- lice, ringworm, or scabies that is untreated and contagious to others.
- any condition which requires more care than staff can provide without compromising the health and safety of other children.

Parents should also adhere to any updated public health guidelines regarding Covid.

If your daughter is going to be absent due to illness please advise the school secretary, Miss Anders, on 01481 721338.



School and Parent Contact

Parents are always welcome to discuss any concerns about their daughter's education. Parents are asked to contact staff at the end of afternoon school about minor matters. For a longer discussion, an appointment should be made with the form teacher. If you wish to see Mrsdela Fosseor MrsThorogood please phone the secretary to make an appointment.

School reports are issued twice yearly, during the Lent Term and at the end of the Trinity Term.

Parents' meetings are held in the Michaelmas and Lent Terms. These meetings operate on an appointment system.

Throughout the year, parents will be invited to various events such as Church Services, Concerts, Sports Days and End of Year celebrations. Parents are invited in to meet their daughter's new teacher in June and be given more details about the following year's curriculum.

Diary dates can be found on the College website. Newsletters are emailed and notes are sent out regularly to keep parents informed of all that is happening in school. A Weekly Bulletin is also emailed to advise and remind parents of forthcoming events.

Help, at the class teacher's direction and discretion, is appreciated with cookery, technology and school outings. Police checks will be required for parent helpers and in addition Child Protection Level 1 & 2 training is required for parents who work alone with the girls. Parents wishing to help in school may apply for a DBS check. Please contact Miss Anders on 721338 to make an appointment to complete the relevant forms.

Worries, Concerns and Complaints

If you have any concerns about your daughter during her time at Melrose please do not hesitate to contact us. Most minor problems can be sorted out quickly by talking to your child's class teacher. If you feel that the class teacher is unable to help, the Head Teacher will be happy to discuss the matter with you. In the unlikely event that the Head Teacher is unable to help or your concern or complaint is of a more serious nature, please write to the Principal, Ms D. Harford-Fox. Complaints may also be made to the Independent Schools' Inspectorate - www.isi.net. You should expect to receive a written response notifying you of the outcome of our investigations within a maximum period of twenty-eight days.



Pupil Well-being

Pupil well-being is extremely important and we work hard to provide supportive pastoral care for the girls. Mrs Donnelly is our appointed PSHE & Well-being Subject Leader at Melrose, ensuring that the PSHE curriculum is maintained and kept up-to-date and that 'well-being' remains at the core of life at Melrose. This has been recognised recently through Melrose achieving the 'Well-being Award for Schools', the only school in the Channel Islands to do so.

The girls are supported by the PSHE framework alongside learning the Decider Skills which they can use to support their social and emotional well-being. More information can be found in The Decider Skills Booklet.

Through assemblies and class sessions, the girls are taught the importance of mindfulness and self-awareness along with techniques that they can use to manage their emotions and self-calm, including yoga and breathing techniques.

The College has a School Counsellor for the emotional support of the girls. If you are concerned about your daughter and would like to access the School Counsellor, this can be done via the class teacher or Head Teacher.

Pupils are made aware that if they are worried about anything (however small or big the problem) it is important to talk about it.

Parental Consent

The Ladies' College, Melrose, handles personal data about pupils and parents. The personal data held by us must be verified annually by parents/guardians of students of The Ladies' College.

Why does this form need to be completed?

The College is collecting information in order to meet our statutory responsibilities for the education of children. Whilst some of the data we hold is of legitimate interest, such as webservices (OneDrive, Sharepoint, CEM Durham) there are other areas where we must seek your active consent. Accordingly, we need to establish the following information about you and your daughter to comply with these responsibilities under the Education Act 1996, the School Standard and Framework Act 1998, the Data Protection Act of 1998 and the replacement GDPR legislation, April 2018, where we are required to ask for your active consent.

The personal information that you provide enables us to fulfil our contractual obligations in providing information about your daughter's progress and attainment and to inform you of events and activities.

What information is being collected?

The information we hold about you and your daughter must be accurate. Each year we ask that you inform us of any changes and agree to the detail that we hold. This information will be used to support us in meeting your daughter's needs in school. It will be shared with external agencies, including the Education Services and those who have the duty to safeguard young people in our community.

In addition to the details on this form, your daughter's internal examination results are processed in order for us to monitor progress.

Hair

Hair which touches the shoulder must be tied back. Hair Bands/scrunchies must be plain green, navy, or brown or striped to match the summer dress.

ALL items must be clearly marked with embroidered/iron-on name tapes unless otherwise specified.

Uniform Chest

The Melrose PTA offer second hand uniform for sale at the start of each term.

Stationery

Girls are expected to bring a small pencil case with basic items of stationery to school. A list of items will be available at Curriculum Evening. These items should be named.

Reflective wear

Reflective armbands or belts may be worn to and from school when walking or riding on the roads on dark winter mornings or afternoons. They may be obtained from cycle shops.

Sunglasses are permitted.







Traffic Arrangements

Guidelines when entering The Ladies' College campus

Please approach from the Rohais direction if at all possible. If you approach from the Grange and cannot immediately turn in, please drive on and around the back of St. Stephen's Church.

We operate a one-way system with traffic turning left from the roundabout through the gates to the netball court parking area, then traffic leaving should cross the grey gravel parking area to re-join the roundabout by the Art and Drama building.

Safety for girls being dropped off and picked up is our priority and so we ask you to drive very slowly and carefully.

When parking on the netball court, please be sure to leave access to the grey gravel area so that traffic can flow freely.

There is a 5-mph speed limit on site.

Car Parking Reminders:

- Never wait in the entrance drive.
- Never stop on the area marked 'Keep Clear'.
- Please do not think that one or two people not conforming will not matter.
- If everyone conforms there will be few delays.
- If a few do not conform everyone gets delayed.
